**Towards A Comprehensive Architecture Of Social Rights In Old Age**

There is a broad agreement on the general principles of social protection, including universalism, non-discrimination, and accountability. The message of the discussion in the group was to go beyond restating these general principles, by identifying specific gaps and deficiencies that call for action. First, older persons lack visibility in policies and human rights documents. Awareness for issues of old age needs to be raised, and rights and policies need to address older persons explicitly. Second, standards of adequacy of social provisions often remain vague. Procedures for defining standards that take account of the needs of older persons have to be put in place. Third, availability of fiscal resources is a condition of human rights policies that is often neglected. We need to identify the concrete effects of cuts in public spending on the living situation of older persons and vulnerable groups.
